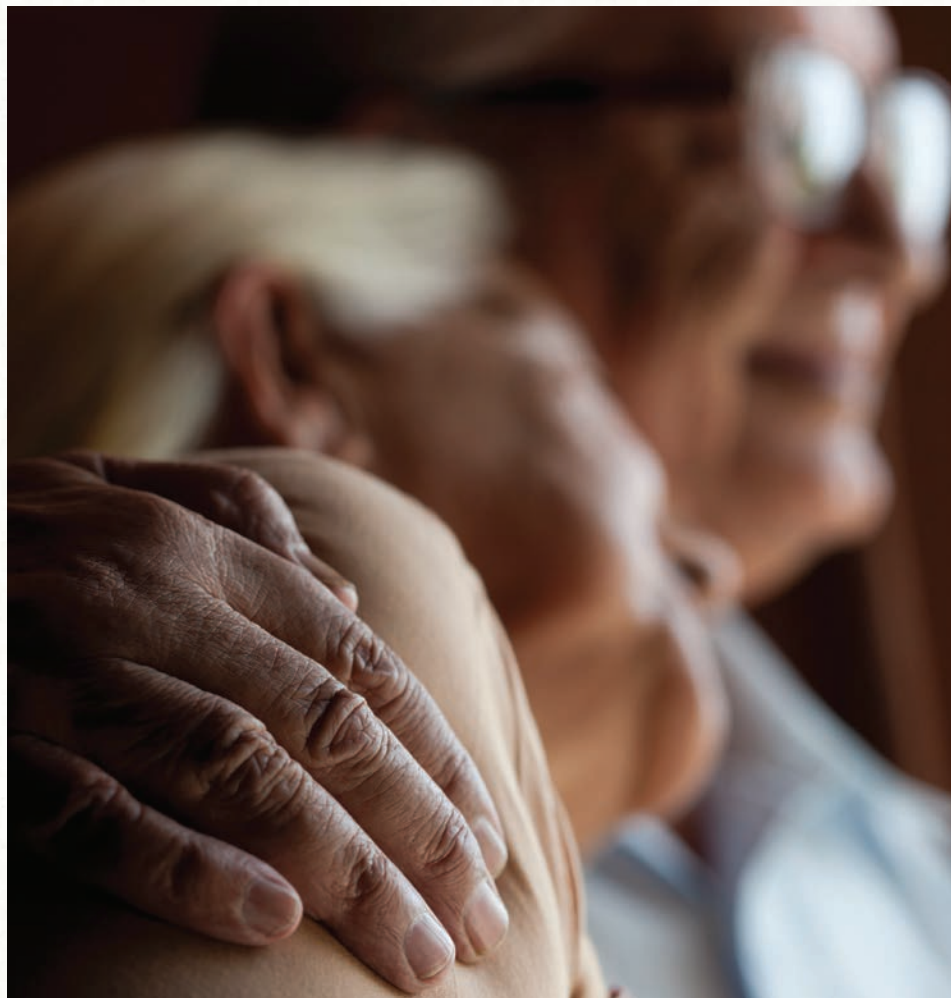

Healing

Healing is at the heart of Saprea’s mission—creating spaces where survivors of child sexual abuse can find **hope**, **connection**, and a **path forward**. Through trauma-informed programs designed to meet survivors wherever they are, Saprea offers opportunities to understand the impact of trauma, build self-compassion, and reconnect with personal strength. Whether through the immersive experience of the **Saprea Retreat**, the accessibility of virtual **Healing Webinars**, or the ongoing connection found in survivor-led **Support Groups**, each program is designed to foster meaningful, lasting healing.

In 2025, hundreds of survivors engaged with these services—many for the first time—taking courageous steps toward reclaiming their voice and reshaping their future.

SAPREA RETREAT

The Saprea Retreat, our flagship service, is a four-day, psychoeducational experience where survivors learn how trauma affects the brain and body, practice mindfulness, and rediscover connection and self-compassion.

In 2025, **390 participants** attended the Saprea Healing Retreat, joining more than **6,000 women** who have experienced this transformative program since its inception.

One of the most meaningful moments at retreat is the kintsugi bowl activity, inspired by the Japanese art of repairing broken pottery with gold. As a group, they intentionally break a bowl. This takes on a different meaning for each survivor. Some feel the bowl represents their childhood; others feel the pieces represent their broken trust. No matter what “breaks” they’ve experienced, their journey is meaningful. They then carefully repair the

bowl, piece by piece, with gold-colored resin. They are then left to dry. On Thursday, as the retreat concludes, each survivor uses their restored bowl to accept symbolic gifts of strength and healing from other participants.

In November 2025, Saprea hosted two back-to-back **Kosher retreats** for female survivors of child sexual abuse within the kosher-observing community, with full cohorts serving a total of **30 women**. Building on this momentum, Saprea will offer a Kosher Retreat for female survivors within the Jewish community in 2026 for the fourth consecutive year, bringing the total number of Kosher Retreats to eight since 2022.

HEALING WEBINAR

Saprea’s Healing Webinar offers an accessible, trauma-informed introduction to healing for adult female survivors of child sexual abuse. This three-hour virtual experience, facilitated by trauma informed educators and a co-teacher, combines psychoeducation with mindfulness and grounding practices that participants can begin using right away in their daily lives.

In 2025, the Healing Webinar continued to make this healing resource accessible from home, reaching survivors who may not yet be ready or able to attend the in-person Saprea Retreat. Sessions were provided in English and Spanish, allowing participants around the world to learn, reflect, and connect in a safe online environment.

These virtual gatherings extended Saprea’s reach across **24 countries**, providing survivors around the world with access to education, connection, and healing support.

SUPPORT GROUPS

Led by survivors, for survivors, Saprea Support Groups ensure that the connections formed at retreat continue long after participants return home.

Currently there are a total of **99 active support groups**, creating consistent spaces for connection and healing. This includes **92 groups in English**, along with a growing international presence through **five Spanish groups**, **one French group**, and **one German group**—ensuring survivors can access support in languages

that feel most comfortable and accessible to them.

Though all our programming focuses on connecting survivors with a supportive community, our Support Groups perhaps capture the heart of this best. Each of these groups is run by individuals with lived experience who believe in the importance of connecting with a group who “gets it.” Our group leaders share their time running these groups and fill a need in many communities that often don’t have robust resources for survivors. One group shared how one of their members travels three hours roundtrip twice a month to participate in their in-person group, highlighting how these groups provide an invaluable service for survivors as well as the commitment these individuals have to show up for each other.

Healing for Prison Population

In 2025, Saprea expanded its healing reach with the national rollout of “How Can I Heal from Child Sexual Abuse?,” a 10-module, trauma-informed course developed for, and accessible to, incarcerated survivors across the United States.

Thanks to the generosity of the Stirling Foundation, in August, Saprea was able to gain access to additional impact data for incarcerated individuals engaging with our course. From August-December, below is the a break down of course completions by gender:



Developed by Saprea’s clinical and education teams, the course offers survivors tools to understand trauma, build self-compassion, and reclaim their sense of worth. The course is delivered through a partnership with Edovo, a nonprofit organization that provides secure online learning platforms within correctional facilities.

Originally developed with female survivors of child sexual abuse in mind, this course was available to all incarcerated individuals. The data indicate the majority of participants were male, and many provided feedback that they'd like to see a male focused course:

“The course was good but was geared for women only. There needs to be some information geared toward men...”

Because of this feedback and data, in 2026 Saprea will develop a course focused on incarcerated men, as well as explore expanding programming for the general public through a similar asynchronous course offering.

From Hidden Pain to Healing Light

Community Voices:
Survivor Stories

Jessica grew up in a small town in Northern California in the 1980s, where children roamed freely and trust defined the community. One adult, well known and deeply embedded in town life, became part of her daily world. Over time, that trust was exploited. The abuse began gradually, following months of careful boundary-crossing that left Jessica confused and isolated.

To survive, Jessica learned to compartmentalize, mentally sealing away anything that felt “icky” and carrying on as though it did not exist. The abuse left her burdened with shame and self-blame that followed her into adulthood. Even when she could intellectually understand that the abuse was not her fault, the emotional weight remained.

Years later, after the birth of her daughter, Jessica experienced a

profound reckoning. Holding her child, she realized the abuse she had endured could happen to her daughter. That moment led her to disclose her story to her husband, whose belief and reassurance marked an important step toward healing.

Jessica discovered Saprea unexpectedly while driving past its building in Utah and later learning more online. At a Saprea Retreat, she participated in kintsugi, for her, symbolizing that healing does not erase what was broken but honors it as part of one’s story. Through survivor-centered practices, movement, reflection, and community, Jessica found validation and hope.

With Saprea’s support, healing created a ripple effect, restoring Jessica’s sense of self and empowering her to support others on their own paths toward healing.

Finding Purpose Through Healing

Community Voices:
Survivor Stories

Amber's abuse began when she was around seven years old and was perpetrated by her grandfather. She disclosed just before her ninth birthday, on a night when a babysitter unexpectedly canceled and her parents said they would ask her grandfather to watch her instead. Faced with that possibility, Amber spoke up.

Her parents immediately went to the police, and for the first time, Amber felt relief. Although the abuse ended, she did not anticipate how deeply its effects would linger. What followed was silence. The experience was rarely discussed, and the absence of conversation was filled with shame. Amber internalized the message that she was "bad," a label she eventually decided to own and push to its extreme.

As she grew older, Amber chased love and validation in the only way she knew how. She later recognized this behavior as a trauma response, a way of normalizing what had happened to her even after the abuse had

stopped. The more she sought connection this way, the worse she felt about herself.

Her family struggled to know how to support her, and Amber felt increasingly alone. Eventually, she shared her pain in a social media post seeking understanding and connection. A friend responded by telling her about Saprea.

Attending a Saprea Retreat became a turning point. The four-day experience was one of the most meaningful things she had ever done for herself. For the first time, Amber realized she was not alone—an insight that marked a powerful shift in her healing journey.

More than ten years later, she remains committed to her healing journey, carrying forward the understanding, connection, and hope she first found at Saprea.

Prevention

Saprea’s prevention efforts are made possible through the generosity of donors and the strength of community partnerships. Together, we are building safer environments for children by expanding access to critical education and resources that help prevent child sexual abuse before it occurs. In 2025, donor support enabled Saprea to deepen partnerships at the local, national, and global levels, grow a network of trained community educators, and reach thousands of individuals with prevention programming. These collective efforts are not only increasing awareness, but equipping communities with the tools and confidence to protect children and foster lasting change.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION

In 2025, this work accelerated through a statewide push throughout Utah to grow Saprea’s Community Educator (CE) network, a “train-the-trainer” model that equips individuals to deliver accessible, grassroots prevention education. Through virtual and in-person trainings, Community Educators are prepared to teach topics such as reducing the risk of child sexual abuse, fostering healthy sexuality, and helping teens understand consent. This approach led to **2,498 participants completing prevention courses** across multiple languages, with the majority reached through Spanish-language instruction. Saprea also expanded its CE network to **334 total educators**, including **119 newly trained in 2025**, with growth both locally—training 50 educators across Utah counties such as Salt Lake, Utah, and Weber—and globally, including French-speaking regions of Africa.

Further strengthening this impact, Saprea received approval from the Utah State Board of Education as

a preferred provider of child sexual abuse prevention curriculum, opening doors for Community Educators and staff to deliver programming directly within K–12 schools, from staff trainings to parent education nights.

2025 Prevention Partnership Highlights



Saprea's VP of Program Fulfillment, Karen Brown, currently participates in the Davis County Health Department's Abuse Prevention Workgroup. This group meets monthly to collaborate on best practices, share information about trainings and upcoming events, and brainstorm any challenges working group members face. Our involvement in the Davis County Health Department has also provided a critical framework for engaging and collaborating with Heath Departments across the state of Utah.

SOCIAL CASCADE

Social Cascade is a partner helping to connect Saprea to pediatric and family practitioners. Social Cascade aids medical providers with their social media accounts, and a key aspect of their model is highlighting other organizations and experts who provide critical content for family well-being. Saprea partnered with Social Cascade by curating 30 posts to be able to share on the

social media accounts of doctors' offices across the country. Our partnership started in July 2025, and we now connect with 18,000+ more followers through our collaboration. In addition, this new audience is connecting with us through the credibility of pediatric offices.



We partnered with Be Humanitarian, a nonprofit organization in Guatemala, to bring our prevention curriculum to mothers whose children participate in the Be Humanitarian after-school program. Through this collaboration, we discovered that many of the participants had never been taught about consent. The classes became a safe space for them to share personal stories and reflect on their experiences. Each participant kept their camera on throughout the sessions, giving us a glimpse into their daily lives as they cooked, cleaned, and cared for their families while fully engaging with the lessons. Across the four biweekly classes, participation ranged from 16 to 20 mothers.

A Voice for Survivors:

Rabbi Avremi Zippel Joins Saprea's Leadership

Rabbi Avremi Zippel brings over two decades of dedicated community leadership and trauma-informed service to his new role on the Saprea Board of Directors. As Executive Director of Chabad Lubavitch of Utah, he has been a tireless advocate for survivors of childhood sexual abuse within the Jewish community, championing culturally sensitive healing spaces long before his official board appointment.

His connection with Saprea began when the organization planned its first ever Saprea Healing Retreat for female survivors with the Jewish community (Kosher Retreat). In 2022, Rabbi Zippel worked closely with Saprea's leadership and culinary team to ensure that the retreat's dietary and spiritual framework aligned with Orthodox Jewish practice, creating a safe, inclusive environment for survivors seeking healing within a faith and culture compatible context.

Through this collaboration, Rabbi Zippel and Saprea not only shaped the retreat's structure but also set a broader precedent for adapting healing services to meet the cultural and religious needs of diverse communities. His leadership will now help guide Saprea's strategic growth into new sectors, partnerships, and demographics, continuing to expand access to healing resources for survivors worldwide.





Awareness

Across 2025, Saprea expanded its reach and influence through a diverse set of awareness, advocacy, and engagement efforts designed to elevate the conversation around child sexual abuse and connect survivors to healing resources. From high-visibility public campaigns and national media features to global research presentations and community-based events, these initiatives amplified Saprea's voice and reinforced its leadership in prevention and trauma-informed care. Strategic partnerships, thought leadership opportunities, and mission-driven gatherings—both locally and internationally—created meaningful platforms to educate, inspire, and mobilize communities. Together, these efforts reflect Saprea's ongoing commitment to increasing awareness, fostering collaboration, and driving lasting social change.

BILLBOARD

Thanks to the generosity of the RLC Foundation, Saprea launched two billboards along I-15, Utah's primary corridor through the Wasatch Front, to increase public awareness of child sexual abuse and ensure survivors know help is available. Running from October 2025 through October 2026, the billboards provide a full year of high-visibility outreach, extending Saprea's message of hope, healing, and prevention to thousands of commuters each day.

IN THE NEWS

In 2025, Saprea was featured on Good Things Utah, where survivor advocate Amber Washington discussed her memoir (W)HOLE and her healing journey alongside Executive Director Matt Hartvigsen, helping elevate awareness of childhood trauma and Saprea's resources for survivors.

On September 16, 2025, Saprea was featured on WATC TV 57, Atlanta where community leader

Cathryn Marshall and Executive Director Matt Hartvigsen highlighted Saprea's mission and the importance of healing and prevention in addressing childhood sexual abuse.

AWARDS

Saprea was honored by the Salt Lake Communication Council of Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints as one of five of their charities of the year.

WORLD ASSOCIATION FOR SEXUAL HEALTH 27TH CONGRESS

On June 16–19, 2025, Saprea participated in and presented at the World Association for Sexual Health (WAS) 27th Congress in Brisbane, a premier international convening of sexual health researchers, clinicians, and educators. Saprea was represented by Dr. Betsy Kanarowski, Chief Clinical Officer, and Brian Walker, Research Lead, alongside collaborator Dr. Sarah Hall (Brigham Young University). There, Saprea presented evidence-based healing and prevention



approaches for survivors of childhood sexual abuse, presenting two oral research papers and one poster focused on trauma triggers, program efficacy, and longitudinal retreat outcomes. The conference, held in partnership with regional sexology organizations and featuring contributors such as UNESCO, provided a global platform to engage with practitioners and researchers from more than a dozen countries and to participate in symposia aligned with Saprea's prevention mission, including healthy sexuality education for children and families. Noteworthy outcomes included strong peer validation of Saprea's research, meaningful international collaboration conversations, and a networking exchange with researchers from the University of Michigan, further strengthening Saprea's position as a recognized leader in trauma-informed care within the global sexual health community.

TO KILL A WOLF: FILM PREVIEW & PANEL DISCUSSION

On July 24, 2025, Saprea partnered with the independent film *To Kill a Wolf* to advance awareness around sexual abuse, silence, and healing through storytelling. Saprea's Chief Clinical Officer, Dr. Betsy Kanarowski, joined a live post-screening panel with director Kelsey Taylor and Jetta Bernier, Executive Director of Enough Abuse, following a free national preview of the film. This modern re-imagining of *Little Red Riding Hood* catalyzed meaningful dialogue, offering clinically informed insight, survivor-centered perspective, and practical resources that reinforce Saprea's commitment to education, prevention, and healing.

Symposium Effecting Societal Change for CSA

On April 29, 2025, Saprea hosted its **first Symposium on Effecting Societal Change for Child Sexual Abuse in Georgia**, convening community leaders, advocates, educators, and nonprofit partners in Alpharetta to unite around a shared goal: reducing the risk of child sexual abuse through prevention, awareness, and collective action.

The symposium was held in collaboration with Atlanta Area Council, Children's Advocacy Centers of Georgia, Georgia Center for Child Advocacy, Savvy Cyber Kids, and Wellspring Living, reflecting a strong, cross-sector commitment to protecting children and supporting survivors.

Throughout the day, participants engaged in presentations and facilitated discussions exploring prevention strategies, community education, and survivor-centered healing approaches. Speakers and panelists shared insights

on reducing risk, strengthening protective factors, and mobilizing communities to respond more effectively to child sexual abuse across systems and settings.

The symposium emphasized the importance of shared responsibility and coordinated action. Managing Director of Saprea, Chris Yadon, underscored this message, stating,

“By raising awareness on the issue, we can empower communities to better reduce the risk for future generations.”

This inaugural Georgia symposium marked an important milestone in Saprea's expanding community-based prevention efforts and laid the foundation for continued collaboration and impact across the state.



Mobilizing for Prevention and Protection

Fourth Annual Safe Symposium

On October 7, 2025, the **SAFE Coalition and Saprea** co-hosted the **Fourth Annual SAFE Symposium at Utah Valley University**, bringing together survivors, advocates, educators, policymakers, and nonprofit leaders to unite around one shared goal: ending child sexual abuse through prevention and education.

The full-day event featured a powerful lineup of speakers who shared diverse perspectives on advocacy, faith, and systems change:

Derek Brown, Utah Attorney General, discussed how collaboration between government, schools, and community organizations is essential to building protective environments for children.

Rabbi Avremi Zippel, Saprea Board Member and Executive Director of Chabad Lubavitch of Utah, spoke on creating faith-compatible healing spaces and the importance of addressing child sexual abuse openly within religious communities.

Deondra Brown, musician and survivor advocate, shared her personal story and emphasized the role of collective empathy and public awareness in supporting healing and accountability.

Cara Dalquist, community prevention strategist, highlighted practical, place-based prevention efforts that strengthen local networks and empower families to recognize and respond to risk.

Throughout the day, participants attended interactive panels and breakout sessions exploring topics such as online exploitation, community prevention models, and the power of cross-sector collaboration. These conversations provided actionable tools for educators, caregivers, and leaders working to prevent child sexual abuse at every level.

Thanks to their collective efforts, the event raised over \$138,000 to combat child sexual abuse and its profound societal impacts.

2025 Saprea Utah Gala

Saprea's 2025 "Currents of Hope" Gala, held at the Loveland Living Planet Aquarium on Friday, November 14, marked a meaningful milestone as the organization celebrated 10 years since its founding, raising \$421,000 gross to further Saprea's mission to liberate society and individuals from child sexual abuse and its lasting impacts.

Chaired by **Raylene Anderson** and guided by the dedicated leadership of **Saprea's Philanthropy Advisory Committee (PAC)**, the evening reflected months of volunteer planning and a shared commitment to survivor healing and prevention education. Guests experienced moving musical performances by Savannah Stevenson, an acclaimed actress and singer best known for her role as Glinda in London's West End production of *Wicked*, and the One Voice Children's Choir the Utah-based, internationally known youth choir with 4M+ YouTube subscribers and winners of the John Lennon International Music Award. Guests also experienced compelling video storytelling, and a powerful survivor testimony from Jessica Ludlow, who appeared on stage with her husband to share how access to healing support transformed her life and family, noting, "Being able to experience true healing, enabled me to not just survive, but to thrive."

During the event, Matt Hartvigsen, Executive Director of Saprea, shared,

"As we reflect on the past 10 years, this evening affirms that healing is real, prevention is possible, and awareness truly saves lives. The support shown here tonight will carry that work forward for generations."

The program also honored founders Derek and Shelaine Maxfield with a custom recognition award crafted and donated by O.C. Tanner, for their vision and leadership, highlighted a decade of growing global impact, and concluded with a collective call to action, reinforcing Saprea's commitment that 100% of donations directly support mission driven programs advancing healing, prevention, and awareness.

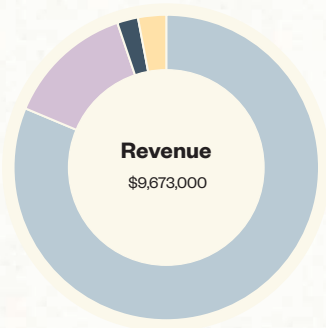

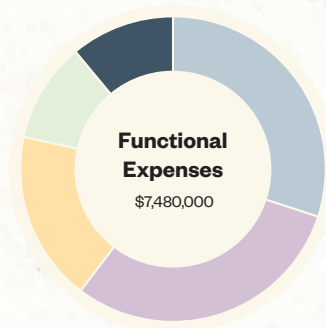

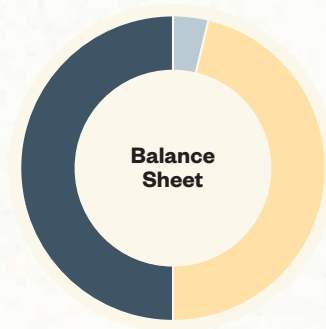
